There are 573,000 minimum wage worker statewide. Research by the United Way in their 2019 ALICE report determined that the minimum survival budget for an individual in Maryland was \$23,568.

If passed, HB 1256 allows an individual to protect \$23,634 per year – basically the bare minimum needed to survive in our state. HB 1256 does not enrich individuals who owe debts – it simply ensures that they can protect the minimum needed to provide for the bare necessities.

Individuals who have their wages protected:

- Can still have their bank accounts seized;
- Can be garnished up to their last \$23,634. So, if an individual's net income was 27,000; \$3,366 of their income can still be garnished.

Thirty-two states do a better job of protecting their low-wage residents than Maryland. Isn't it time for MD to stop failing our working families?
